HEADTEACHER'S MESSAGE

Making our classrooms even better!

School improvement is a continuous journey and we are always thinking deeply about ways to further enhance children's experience in our school. We are currently undertaking research about how the physical classroom environment can affect children's well-being, focus and concentration.

Year 5 Birch are leading the way with this as a case study.

Their teacher, Mr. Simpson, is trialling making changes to our traditional classroom designs and teaching strategies. These include changes to sensory aspects such as lighting (using lamps and string lights), scent diffusers and music alongside additions to classroom furniture such as open bookshelves to create zones, positive affirmation areas, and the addition of more green plants. I enjoyed spending all day with the class on Tuesday this week and was wholeheartedly encouraged by how well the children are doing both socially and academically. Children feel very positive about their classroom and feel it is making a real difference to their well-being.

We're currently creating a case study around this and will be looking to roll out any positive outcomes to other classes in the future.

To bring the topic to life for all our pupils, we filled our school hall with a planetarium and all year groups enjoyed spending time in this magical inflatable dome which creates an artificial night sky to explore learning about the solar system, sun, planets and stars – what a memorable and magical experience!





ART GALLERY

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ATTENDANCE

In a strive to continue to improve on our already good attendance, we would like to request that if your child is poorly, you ring and speak to someone at school in person on the third day. This is to help safeguard our children and to check if there is anything further we can do to support you.

We aim for children to attend school for at least 95% of the school year. Of course, we understand that children do get poorly but should their attendance go below 90%, they are considered a 'Persistent Absentee' and we are obliged this to report these cases to our Educational Welfare Officer. Each child's attendance is looked at carefully and we will always aim to support you as much as possible if your child's attendance is of concern – please do work with us and talk to us as this makes it so



Staying Safe against Al scams.

Staying safe online can be incredibly worrying for everyone and with the increased use of AI, this can make the digital world an even scarier place. Whilst it is always important to keep our children safe online, as highlighted in the previous newsletter, it is also important that we keep ourselves safe. Scammers are increasingly using voice-enabled AI models to automate their fraudulent schemes. The tricking of individuals has become highly popluar. Training Day

School is closed to pupils on Friday 14th February (Friday before half term) for a teacher training day. School will re-open after the half term break on Monday 24 February.

Mobile phones

There is a blanket prohibition of mobile phone use in school grounds by pupils. This includes before school and after school. Where parents have provided consent for our oldest pupils in year 6 to bring a phone to school, these must be turned off at all times in the school grounds and handed in to teachers to be safely stored until the end of the school day.

Dogs

Dogs are not allowed on school premises or to be tied to school railings during pick up and drop-off periods. Thank you for your support with this.

Snack and water

We encourage the children to drink regularly through the day. Children should bring their own water bottle and only water is allowed – no juice/squash or other drink – thank you. We are seeing a trend of children bringing in very expensive water bottles and would strongly advise against this as, in a class of 30 children, these could become lost/damaged/muddled with others. Children are allowed to bring fruit or veg for snack only at playtime.

School shoes

It is important that children look smart for school and our school uniform is that black school shoes are worn by both boys and girls – no trainers please.

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
